The Foundation has been focused on three major projects over the past several months: our Annual Appeal, eliciting support required for on-going research initiatives, and an overall update of the health information available online, beginning with revision of the recommended guidelines for health testing.

Our Annual Appeal was successful, given the economic pressures that many are currently experiencing. The Appeal itself generated \$11.2 thousand in donations between October 1 and the end of February, compared with \$12.6 thousand raised during the same period last year. However, we had donations of over \$6 thousand during the period that were not a direct result of the Annual Appeal, bringing our total donations for the period to \$17.4 thousand, compared with \$17.1 in the previous year. We are deeply grateful for everyone's support.

In the fall, we launched two campaigns, asking Cairn owners to participate in two research programs: the Dog Aging Project, a large-scale project designed to gain insights into health over the lifetime of a dog; and Cornell University's work to find a genetic test for Legg-Calvé-Perthes Disease (LCPD). In November, the Trustees met virtually with Dr. Seth Eaton to discuss the work on ocular melanosis being done by the School of Veterinary Medicine at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. We concluded that asking Cairn owners to participate in this work, in addition to supporting the work being done by Dr. Simon Petersen-Jones at Michigan State University, has great merit, given the importance of finding a marker to detect a predisposition to this condition in our dogs. Again, information on ways that Cairn owners can participate in both these research initiatives is on our website.

A committee of the Foundation, chaired by Louise Hooper, with Beth Wilder and Pat Joyce, and with support from those who recently updated the health standards for the Canadian club, is working to provide better health information online. As a first step, the committee reviewed the existing CTCA document "National Breed Club Recommended Health Testing Guidelines," which was approved in 2016, and updated it. They kept the format short to make it easy to read, while providing a solid overlay of Cairn health. The newly updated standards, approved by the CTCA Board of Governors at their March meeting are on both the CTCA and Foundation websites.

The Foundation is enthusiastic about expanding the health information available online, including updating any health information that is out of date and creating a downloadable document with information about Cairn health that would be available at no cost to all.

Cairn Terrier Recommended Health Testing Guidelines

Approved by the Board of Governors (03/02/2023)

The Cairn Terrier is, by definition, an "active, game, and hardy" small terrier. They are long-lived dogs, with a life span averaging 13-16 years of age. The Cairn Terrier is a healthy breed; However, purebred dogs, on average, have 3 -5 genetic faults, the Cairn is not without its health issues.

The following lists minimal health testing guidelines approved by the Board of Governors of the Cairn Terrier Club of America.

Globoid Cell Leukodystrophy (GCL)

- *Who to test:* Any adult Cairn (dog or bitch) prior to breeding who has not been previously cleared by test or parentage.
- *Performed by:* Veterinarian or Breeder/Owner, with purchased DNA swab.
- *Comments:* This is a DNA based test. It can be performed as an individual test or as part of a panel of genetic tests.

Liver Portosystemic Vascular Anomaly (PSVA) and Microvascular Dysplasia (MVD)

- *Who to test:* Puppies 12-16 weeks, and any adult Cairn (dog or bitch) prior to breeding.
- *Performed by:* Veterinarian
- *Comments:* A Bile Acid test is a blood test to check for hepatic insufficiency and

or Deformed Kidney (dysplasia)**

- *Who to test:* Puppies at 12-15 weeks and any adult Cairn (dog or bitch) prior to breeding who has not been cleared as normal.
- *Performed by:* Board Certified Veterinary Ultrasonographer / Radiologist.
- *Comments:* If abnormalities are detected a Veterinary specialist may need to be consulted.

Ocular Melanosis (OM) CERF/CAER

Eye Exam

- *Who to test:* All Cairns 2 years of age and older to screen for any eye problems before breeding. Follow up exams should be done periodically during a dog's life as OM may present as a new health problem in older dogs.
- *Performed by:* Veterinary Ophthalmologist
- *Comments:* Formal eye examination, performed with dilation, is the only test currently available for this condition

Craniomandibular Osteopathy (CMO)

- *Who to test:* Any adult Cairn (dog or bitch) prior to breeding who has not been cleared by test or parentage.
- *Performed by:* Veterinarian or Breeder / Owner, with purchased DNA swab.
- *Comments:* This is a DNA based test. It can be performed as an individual test or as part of a panel of genetic tests.

Cardiac Exam

- *Who to test:* Puppies 12-16 weeks, and any adult Cairn (dog or bitch) prior to breeding.
- *Performed by:* Veterinarian
- *Comments:* If abnormalities are detected a Veterinary Cardiologist should be consulted.

Patella Exam

- *Who to test:* Puppies 12-16 weeks, and any adult Cairn (dog or bitch) prior to breeding.
- *Performed by:* Veterinarian.
- *Comments:* If abnormalities are detected a Veterinary Orthopedist
